

DUE TO CONGESTION IN THE PARKING LOT WHERE WE'VE BEEN MEETING AT THE EAST BOULDER REC CENTER, WE ARE MOVING TO A SMALLER PARKING LOT JUST WEST OF THERE (THE FIRST RIGHT AFTER YOU MAKE THE TURN AROUND THE CURVE COMING IN ON 55TH FROM BASELINE, WEST OF THE TENNIS COURT).

Our Summer calendar begins with nesting birds raising their young in July, the first southbound migrants (shorebirds) in late August, the southerly migration of songbirds in the first half of September, and golden aspens as September ends. We've scheduled trips to see all of these, along with the birds of the higher mountain forests that we haven't yet seen this year.

Bring a little money to chip in for carpooling if warranted, and to buy yourself a cup of coffee afterward. Most trips return to the EBRC parking lot by 11:00 am, then we head to Big Daddy's Bagels in the Meadows Shopping Center for coffee. 2. EVENING BIRD TRIP IN THE CITY

We will repeat a fun evening trip we did last year, starting off by looking for Common Nighthawks in the meadows north of town, then coming into the city to scan the skies for Chimney Swifts. We'll end the evening over a beer or a glass of wine on Lonny's roof, watching for chimney swifts overhead. Here's the plan: Meet at the **Foothills** Trailhead Parking Lot at 7:00 pm Wednesday evening. To get there, drive north on US 36/28th St until it intersects with Broadway, then go just 1/4 mile farther and turn right (east) onto the north Broadway extension, (it turns into a gravel road). The parking lot is on the left a few hundred yards down the road. We'll check for nighthawks in this area, then drive a bit south to check the extensive meadows to the east of 26th St (also gravel) just east of the Forest Service office. We will then drive to Lonny's house at 1644 Pine Street to look for libations and Chimney Swifts.

In Memoriam



Elizabeth Mekkelsen, 1914-2018

Elizabeth Mekkelsen's loving heart stopped on May 23 as she sat in a chair looking out the window looking at birds. Interested in everything in the natural world, Elizabeth lived a rich life for 104 years and 3 months, and was her usual lucid, cheerful self to the end. Many old-timers in the Boulder area got their start at birding from Elizabeth who led her elementary school students on natural history field trips, taught for the National Wildlife Federation, and was an early member of the Boulder Bird Club, which she often chaired. One of my vivid memories is hiking with Elizabeth above treeline when we were caught by a severe thunderstorm. With dark clouds and lightning bolts all around, Elizabeth remained sunny. She was sad about the state of our world but lived her own life with kindness and optimism.
